## MAR27-30 EXTN: Cruise / Resort / Nazca Lines (\$990)

Next day take an over-flight of the Nazca Lines-hundreds of mysterious drawings and markings of unknown origin that can be viewed only from the air (check the web). ## MAR 28 • LIMA-ISLANDS CRUISE-ICA

Having toured Peru's la sierra (mountain region) and la selva (jungle region) depart via motor coach to experience the third of Peru's three major ecological zones, la costa (desert costal region). Selected sites in the dry costal desert have received no recorded rainfall for decades: rather, the region is fed by riverlets from the Andes mountains that allow for the localized production of such agricultural crops as dates and grapes. Take a two hour cruise that encircles the Ballestas Islands, known as "Peru's Galapagos." View thousands of sea lions, seals, and turtles plus tens of thousands of bird life-including albatrosses, pelicans, boobies, cormorants, and penguins. Following a late buffet lunch, settle in at the Las Dunas resort. Visit a nearby oasis and review a short biography on a Stahl school grad's experience in Peru's congress. Then select from such resort offerings as sand dunes, library, museum, art gallery, horse back riding, sauna, pool, and sleep.

## MAR 29 • NAZCA LINES FLIGHT-LIMA

 sunTake a hearty breakfast and then board a small plane for an over flight of the mysterious Nazca Lines. These lines, spread across an incredible 500 sq km of arid and rock-strewn plain, remain one of the world's great archaeological conundrums. The area features over 800 straight lines and some 300 geometric figures, including 70 spectacular animal and plant drawings known as bio-morphs-creations that can be seen only from the air. Return to Lima, dine over the surf as the sun sets at the exquisite La Rosa Nautica restaurant. Then transfer to the airport for a postmidnight flight departure to Los Angeles.

## Peru Tours \& Global Citizenship

## Study tours seek to produce global citizens

La Sierra University is committed to producing graduates grounded in a spiritual, intellectual, and social community that produces global citizens informed by faith and learning. This Peru study tour evidences the university's commitment to take students beyond the classroom by way of experiencing learning in global contexts.
The allocation of fully $90 \%$ of tuition monies to subsidize international study tour fares may well contribute not only to international learning, but also to curriculum design. Study tours prepare students for citizenship in an ever shrinking planet.
"The need to think globally is not reserved for would be diplomats or for students in international business," noted University President Randal Wisbey. "The need to think globally ideally impacts every academic discipline, and these study tours illustrate the various academic disciplines while planting seeds for looking beyond one's inherited culture context and comfort zone."

Note: Saturday flights within the confines of Spring Vacation allow tour participants to worship on Sabbath afternoon with the congregation on the Uros Floating Islands of Lake Titicaca. (A LAX-LIM-CUZ itinerary omitting Lake Titicaca may be possible if requested early.)

## University Mottos / Stahls / Peru

The La Sierra University Aim "From Diversity, Community" no less than the Loma Linda University Motto, "To Make Man Whole" are uniquely exemplified in the life and work of Fernando and Ana Stahl for whom the Stahl Center is named and whose footsteps we trace on this 38th Peru tour.

The Stahls functioned as visionary nurses, social workers, public health educators, and administrators of the first indigenous school system in the Peruvian Andes. This couple is lauded by numerous investigators on three continents for their holistic personal and social witness in Peru's Lake Titicaca Basin at the outset of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century. In a closed and near feudal social order they are credited with opening up life chances for the ninety-two percent Aymara and Quechua population through community clinics, health education, open markets, and by establishing a school system that came to number as many as two hundred schools.

Professor of Religion and Society Charles Teel has mounted more than three-dozen tours to Peru. These tours have included employees, students, faculty, alumni, and community members from La Sierra, Loma Linda, and Andrews Universities. Teel has hosted an international conference in Lima on Indigenous Education in the Andes. Further, he has published in both North and South American peer reviewed journals on the manner in which the founders of this first indigenous school system in Peru's highlands contributed to fostering structural change in that nation's social order-including their contribution to include the addition of a religious toleration clause in Peru's National Constitution.

The Peru-based Catholic Priest who re-introduced Teel to the Stahl story referred to the Stahls as his "spiritual forebears." Noting that "Their gospel was incarnated not only in chapels and churches, but in schools, clinics, city halls, and the national constitution," this priest affectionately tagged the Stahls as "missionaries, visionaries, and revolutionaries!"

## Peru Tour Conditions/Contract iStudy!

OVERVIEW: LSU students, faculty, staff, alums, community members, and retirees have participated in these student level tours for over 30 years-tours that have attracted participants ranging in age from 13 months to 92 years! Early application/deposit is imperative to ensure space on these fully guided and highly subscribed excursions. INCLUDED: Fares cover an escorted tour, airfare, tourist class hotel rooms with private baths plus all land/lake/river/taxi/taxi cholo transport, entrance fees, gratuities, and daily meals as indicated.
PAYMENT: LSU students: pay deposit to LSU Bursar window, bring photocopied receipt \& Tour App to LS203. Pay balance by Jan 15 at Bursar window, and register by Jan 15 for tour coursework at the Records window. Community: Deposits, balances, and signed Tour App are mailed to LSU Bursar with credit card data or check to "Peru Tour" and are recorded on a first-come basis in order received. Note: a late fee of $\$ 400$ obtains if balance is received after Jan 15.
WAITING LIST: When the tour fills, a waiting list is maintained in order of full payment received. (Checks or credit card data are held and deposited only when added space is confirmed by the airline.)
PENALTIES: Cancellation is by registered mail only to Stahl Center. The $\$ 800$ deposit is refunded, less a $50 \%$ service fee, when cancellation (sent via registered mail to LSU Peru Tour / 4500 Riverwalk Pkwy / Riverside CA 92505) is received by Jan 15. Notice received Jan 15-Mar 9 forfeits the full deposit. Notice received March 10-17 forfeits $\$ 1000$ OR requires a replacement plus a $\$ 400$ ticket change fee. Cancellation due to verified illness post Feb 15 equally requires a replacement plus $\$ 400$. "No shows" forfeit all tour monies paid. See under "Insurance," below.
INSURANCE: Tour members agree to follow the tour itinerary in full and to refrain from such high-risk ventures as river ratting, bungee jumping, and on- or off-road motoring. Forms submitted for tourprovided coverage is as follows: lost luggage ( $\$ 1,500$ ), medical ( $\$ 140,000$ ), and limited tour cancellation due to illness ( $\$ 800$ ). Participants may increase personal coverage on their own at their expense.
RELEASE: Tour members will sign a "hold harmless" agreement.
DOCUMENTS: Allow 12 weeks for processing a US passport. US citizens need only a valid passport (no visa) for Peru travel. Tour members are responsible for securing valid passports (and visas, as required for selected non-US citizens). Minors (under age 18) not traveling with both parents must submit at airport a notarized statement signed by both parents (or legal guardians) listing tour dates/itinerary and giving permission for travel by named minors. The tour is not responsible for denied travel due to insufficient documentation. There is no refund for unused services.
LUGGAGE: Limited to a checked wheeled suitcase ( $12^{\prime \prime \times 14 " x 22 " ~ / ~}$ 50 lbs ) plus a carry-on ( 17 lbs ) and a purse or laptop.
MEDICATIONS: No vaccinations are required by the CDC. The CDC recommends countering yellow fever, malaria, and hepatitis A. Given a one-day stay at an altitude of $12,500^{\prime}$ (plus three days at $10,000^{\prime}$ ) tour members should check on health requirements with their physician, including the advisability of taking Diamox or nonsulfur Nifedipine to combat altitude sickness and/or nausea. La Sierra students contact the Student Health Service by mid-February.
STUDENT COURSEWORK \& ATTENDANCE: Studt ${ }_{26}{ }^{-1}$; will attend in full classes on Jan 25, Feb 8, 22, Mar 8, 5-9 PM 5.uj-9:30 PM in La Sierra Hall 204 plus an Apr 262 PM potluck in WH to share food, show photos, and write final exam. Two tardies count as one absence. Missing one of the 5 sessions: grade reduces by one full letter. Missing two of the 5 sessions: grade reduces by two full letters.
PUNCTUALITY: Student promptness on pre-tour activities fosters course integrity while also setting the stage for equally disciplined on-tour expectations: being "on tour" means being "in place / on task / on time" for tour guide presentations and for boarding airplanes, motor coaches, launches, and taxi cholos!
